1 – Overall objective	The overall objective for music provision in your school. Objective: Park Grove is on a mission to achieve excellence in music education.

All music lessons will be delivered by regular class teachers on a weekly basis. This is with the exception of one mixed Y4/5 class which will receive weekly whole class brass tuition led by Miss Clinton. Lessons will be inclusive to all children through differentiation, visual resources and teacher guidance.

Progression and What Next?- Throughout KS1 pupils will focus on percussion instruments and in KS2 children will access either woodwind, strings and brass instruments, depending on class. In future, I would like to expand the WCIT provision to enable all of KS2 to have instrumental lessons taught by a





specialist for at least one term per year. Equally, I would like to broaden the instruments offered during these WCIT sessions.

Funding-Percussion and Recorders are already purchased and labelled ready to be used in the school music room. Brass instruments are being provided by the York Music Hub at a heavily subsidised rate with the school paying £50/term. The school already has some ukuleles but more need to be purchased to fulfil whole class teaching.

Is the scaffolded planning working? Have there been performance opportunities for students to engage with? Is social media working well for the subject?
7 – Transition work with local secondary schools	Gabrieli Christmas Project already agreed with Karen Marshall (Ebor Music Lead), this project collaborates with local secondary schools. Continuation of projects like these. Future idea- to visit secondary schools during rehearsals for school performances.
