



Reception Year Universal Screening and National Child Measurement Programme

Dear Parent/Carer,

The Reception Year is crucial for establishing a good foundation for learning. Many parents/carers report that starting school causes an increase in their child's sleep requirements and for some a change in behaviour. Good routines, a regular bedtime and a balanced diet will all help to keep your child healthy and able to cope with these changes.

Health Screening in Reception Year

We offer the following screening programme to all reception aged children.

Hearing Screening

In reception, a hearing screening is completed with your child. Hearing problems in children are important to detect and treat early as they may affect speech development and progress at school. Some children fail their initial screening due to coughs and colds and are screened again the following school term when the majority then pass. However, if there are still concerns then this will require further investigation. You will be informed of your child's results by letter and if required a referral will be made to audiology at York Teaching Hospital.



Vision Screening

In reception, a vision screening is completed with your child. As children still have developing vision, they sometimes fail their initial screening and are screened again the following school term when the majority then pass. However, if there are still concerns then this will require further investigation. You will be informed of your child's results by letter and if required a referral will be made to ophthalmology at York Teaching Hospital.

National Child Measurement Programme (NCMP)

In reception, your child will be weighed and measured as part of the NCMP. This is carried out during the term in which they have their 5th birthday.

Children who take part will remain fully clothed except for their coats and shoes. The information is recorded on your child's existing electronic health record, and you will be sent a letter with your child's results for your information.
